

As I begin the second of my two-year term as Board Chair, I am so thankful for the deep generosity among the people in our community who stand beside us to support Seacrest Village and its many endeavors.

Most recently, the Women's Auxiliary of the Seacrest Foundation raised over \$3 million for the Homes' Resident Assistance Fund, the program that supports those who otherwise could not afford to live at Seacrest Village.

We can't begin to express the profound appreciation we feel for this outpouring of generosity without explaining the human factor in the \$3 million equation.

Your contributions to the Resident Assistance Fund will help serve the most vulnerable population at Seacrest, our Holocaust survivors. We prioritize them as our first recipients because they have lived such difficult lives and deserve the most tenderhearted care, and we want to make this chapter of their lives unfold with love and ease.

Beyond our Holocaust survivors, there are many others who could not afford to live at Seacrest without our support. They may have suffered illnesses which depleted their savings or perhaps they endured some other misfortune.

The population of people benefiting from this fund is the human factor of which I write, and this by far is the most important part of the equation. Yet, other factors in the equation also illustrate why your gift is so very precious to us.

Factors such as people living longer, the exorbitant rise in health care costs, and the decrease in federal funding make support for our elderly both tenuous and fragile.

While the amount we raised is tremendous, we need to remain steadfast in our mission. It's projected that this year alone the cost of supporting those in need at Seacrest will be \$2.5 million. With this in mind, Seacrest Village is a worthy investment.

As we celebrate our 75th year of service to our community, I'm confident the Homes will continue to be responsive to the ever-changing needs of seniors – our human factor.

I often think about the Jolly 16, those extraordinary women who in the early 1940's knew how vital it was to care for our Jewish seniors. They were visionaries, and by 1944 raised enough money to buy a house on Fourth Ave in San Diego to provide a home for ten elderly members of the community.

I've been privileged to watch the evolution of the visionaries unfold. With every decision made since our inception, we did our best to follow the vision of the Jolly 16 because they laid the brilliant foundation for the trajectory of our organization. They knew how important it was to carve out a spot for our seniors, a place where they could live out their days with dignity and grace.

As we embark upon our next 75 years, it is incumbent upon us to continue that legacy of always looking for better ways to meet the needs of those we serve. We want to keep our eyes on innovations, the latest in technology, and the best care delivery models possible.

Working with seniors requires people with unique gifts who have a deep calling to serve the elderly; people who know this is not so much a 9 to 5 job as it is a 24/7 commitment of the heart. We look for people like Sam Huerta, a member of our building services team who climbed over a fence to help a Seacrest neighbor who had fallen. We look for people like Kristen Madla with our life enrichment team, who arranged a beautiful candlelight dinner for a gentleman in our memory care residence and his wife who were celebrating their 55th wedding anniversary. She even made sure our resident had flowers to give his wife on their special day.

We look for this kind of passion, a quality that you can't necessarily find when perusing credentials on a resume.

During my tenure at Seacrest, I have learned that retaining the most gifted is even more important than attracting them. To preserve our most precious asset, we have to give them the tools they need to succeed and to provide them with the opportunity to grow and be part of something meaningful.

Cultivating a culture of caring, I'm convinced, is what will both attract and retain those with a deep calling to serve our elderly. This is the culture, after all, that cradled our seniors from the beginning, thanks to those goodhearted visionaries, the Jolly 16.


Rabbinic literature is a treasure trove of the most beautiful sayings of the ancient rabbis. One of my favorite sections of the Mishna is Pirkei Avot, a collection of pithy little sayings by the sages which gives us a fantastic insight into the personalities of these otherwise mysterious men.

One of these sayings comes from Ben Zoma, a sage of the first century. He died at a young age and so was never formally given the title of "rabbi," but his words held such great weight that they are included in Pirkei Avot nonetheless. According to our tradition, Ben Zoma was quoted as having said, "Who is wise? One who learns from every person. As it is stated, 'From all my teachers I have grown wise.'" (Psalm 119:99) I do not doubt that by "teachers," Ben Zoma was referring to his own rabbis, those who taught him Torah and Mishna and who spent countless hours instructing him about our traditions. But I believe that this word can mean so much more.

Each of us has been privileged to learn in formal settings from great lecturers, coaches, and professors. Maybe we had a beloved teacher in grammar school, and of course, our parents were our first and most influential teachers. But isn't it possible that the "teachers" from whom we gain the most wisdom are the ones in the informal settings, those whom we encounter as we move through our daily lives? Think of what might we learn from the cashier at Vons, the customer service representative at Amazon or the receptionist at the dentist's office if only we allowed ourselves to see them as our teachers as well! How much wiser might we all become?

As I begin my tenure here as your Director of Spiritual Life and Programs, I hope to continue to learn from my many colleagues, our incredible residents and from all of you as well. I look forward to the privilege of having you all as my teachers and becoming enriched by your wisdom for many years to come!

Kelli Denton, RN Director The Pew Research Center reports a swell of 75 million Baby Boomers in the United States, and 10,000 of them will enter retirement age every day for the next 19 years. This ever-expanding pool of retirees may disagree about everything under the sun, but there's one thing they agree upon: Most people want to live out their days under their own roof.

According to research by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), nearly 90 percent of seniors want to remain in their own homes or "age in place" as people in the industry have coined it. What's more, even as seniors begin to need day to day assistance, most (82%) prefer to stay put. Only 9 percent prefer to move to a facility, while 4 percent would prefer to live at a relative's home.

With these statistics in mind, home care is a crucial safety net. It begs the question: what should people be aware of when choosing a home care company?

The most important element is whether it is licensed. If it is, the caregivers are actual employees of the agency as opposed to independent contractors. This allows the consumer peace of mind, knowing that the caregivers are bonded and insured, undergo background checks and fingerprint clearances, are covered under worker's compensation, and have been cleared by a physician to perform the expected activities.

If the consumer chooses to hire an independent contractor it is essential to know that there are risks involved such as being held liable for federal and state income taxes if the independent contractor fails to pay them, triggering a worker's compensation claim if he or she gets hurt in your home, or potentially facing an unemployment insurance claim if he or she is fired or no longer needed.

In addition, Seacrest at Home remains progressive regarding technology and is currently evaluating several high-tech services, such as telehealth / telemonitoring. Telehealth has advantages to decrease hospitalization, as well as reducing the need for unplanned in-person doctor visits.

Seacrest at Home, founded in 2013, has a five-and-a-half-year reputation for exceptional service, having received multiple recognitions within both the senior and general community. We are expecting a new growth opportunity with Seacrest Home Health, which will provide medical services utilizing licensed nurses. Once that process is complete, Seacrest Home Health will be able to provide skilled nursing services such as medication refills, wound care, etc.

We look forward to continuing to serve our community and hope you will call upon us to do just that.

THE SAN DIEGO HEBREW HOME FOR THE AGED: THE STORY BEGINS

What started as a social group, the Jolly 16 soon became a group dedicated to community service. They were instrumental in helping the Jewish Community in san diego and had a rich history of helping the poor and needy, helping new families get settled, and donating clothes for children. They supported Jews Fleeing from the dangers in eastern europe, waiting in tijuana to cross the border. They met often to discuss the most pressing projects in the 1920s and 30s, and at one such meeting decided it was time to start a home for the elderly. They watched our community's grand-parents go into convalescent homes that were dirty and depressing where the residents were not cared for, and of course, many homes didn't even accept Jews.

THESE 16 COURAGEOUS WOMEN WANTED TO CREATE A HOME FOR THE COMMUNITY'S MOST FRAIL, WHERE THEY COULD MAKE SHABBOS TOGETHER,

HAVE KOSHER MEALS, WHERE THEY WERE COMFORTABLE, AND COULD EVEN HAVE SYNAGOGUE SERVICES BROUGHT TO THEM. THAT'S WHEN THEY DECIDED THEY WOULD EACH RAISE \$500 TO GET STARTED. THEY SOLD PUFF PASTRIES, DOLL CLOTHES, WAX CANDLES, GINGERED ORANGE PEELS, AND SAVED UP THEIR FUNDS.

This dedicated group of Jewish women raised \$8,000, a great deal of money, but it wasn't enough, so they went out to prominent people asking for their support. In 1944, they bought a two-story home on 4th avenue, remodeled it, and opened the san diego hebrew home for the aged with ten beds.






The Viterbi Family Children's Wall


